What is easy to remember is the support from everyone and how as a District we adapted to the changes Scouting gave us. From change in permits, POR, systems and through it we have the crazy days of covid to manage and work through to keep scouting going.

I think this has had the most effect on everyone, it is strange to think those days are now 5 years passed. But I must applaud the association in this instance as it gives us plenty of ideas to keep scouting moving forward, indeed it was seen that many acting ideas went out into educational and the business aspects of the UK. Its one of the many aspects of that time all leaders should be immensely proud of themselves.

In looking back there are many things am sure I could have done better; hindsight is a wonderful thing. You will forgive me if I try not dwell on them.

What we did do over this time was, we took part in two world Jamborees sending young people to America and to Korea which for a small District is fantastic.

Every 2 years we have sent more young persons to Blair than our per capita gave us, always backfilling the numbers others could not fill, many of these patrols taking the camp chiefs pendant, show what we do is recognised, these young persons had a brilliant time, memories for life.

I look at each section and admire the young persons for their determination to get awards. I did love the Christingle service; it was one of the things I did feel bad about how it reduced in numbers from what was one of our main events, but things do change, a chilly night at Bourgh Briggs isn't always the best.

However a more positive note, was the number of sections, as well as group camps across Moray and well out of District, we have seen them go to so many varied events, camps and away days.

Moray is always well represented at National camps across all our age groups, and I am forever thankful for the leaders who take their time to attend these, where there is a camp, there is usually someone from Moray.

We have also managed to increase the permits across the district; this has led to continued replacement of well used equipment available to everyone to use as well as leaders willing to get the activity permits.

I am aware that change happens, changes to Region, POR, Scottish HQ all have a knockon effect, safety and safeguarding work is at times intense and it is never great to have to suspend individuals' fir many varied reasons. Again this went for training, having to do the training can be challenging, but with a team to support it we managed to keep on the right side to the percentages most of the time. I would say that towards the end of my tenure the paperwork side to the job got very heavy, the role became 4 nights a week to get through the requirements of change, this is the main downside of the role the time it takes from you.

I have been incredibly lucky and continue to be.

So as leaders we may not know as we teach that young person a knot, show them bearing, colour in a drawing or sing a song how we will affect them, but from looking back I can say we do an amazing job and what we give as a start in life is something worth doing, it can change lives.

My time looking back is a blur, from meetings to camps to meetings, but most done with a smile and a laugh.

To each and everyone there are so many that had an influence, but to all I say thank you for your patience, understanding and for the friendship on a 10-year journey.

## THE FLAPPING FISH

#### Planning this game

Create paper fish, by drawing outlines onto scrap paper and cutting them out.

You could print out images of fish and use those, or encourage players to draw their own fish. Make sure your meeting place is clear of obstacles and trip hazards – remember that teams might not move in a neat,

straight, line!

Making the fish

Everyone should split into small teams and give each team a paper fish and a newspaper. Each team should decorate their fish with coloured pens and pencils. They could give the fish or their team a name, too.

#### How to play

The first person in each team should flap the newspaper to create some wind. They should try to make sure the breeze catches the paper fish.

They need to flap the piece of paper and move the fish to the other end of the meeting place.

When the first person in each team reaches the other end of the meeting place, they should turn around and flap their newspaper again to take the fish back to the rest of their team.

The fish should have travelled from one side to the other and back again, using only the wind created from the newspaper.

When the first person in each team gets back to their team, the second person should use the newspaper to move the fish to the other side of the room and back again.

Teams should keep playing, taking it in turns as each person needs to move the fish to the other end of the meeting place and back again.

#### *Learn what a satellite is and how they help us to study and protect our planet.*

You could share interesting facts about what satellites have discovered about Earth.

#### Find out about stars and constellations, and how we can view them from Earth.

You could use a telescope or look at some images. Create a model, craft or drawing of a constellation.

## Discover what asteroids and comets are, and how they have affected planets in our solar system.

You could look at what happens when an asteroid or comet hits a planet.

Light Painting

Through utilising lightsabers, torches and ignited wire wool, we have utilised long exposure photography to create a range of light painting effects at Mosstodloch Explorers. The principles are quite straightforward and can be done with most equipment, although in this case a professional Canon DSLR setup was used with a manual trigger to ensure the best images.

Through your Scouts of the World Award journey, you'll develop skills and knowledge that will empower you to undertake a project that will make a sustainable impact on your local, national or international community, while developing your own skills.

You'll learn skills including: independence, team work, project management, budgeting and communication skills, while gaining an understanding of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. You can complete the award anywhere in the world, including your home country and this can be completed as a team, with each member playing a project management role and completing 80 hours+ of work towards the project.

One major issue seems to be an error that looks as though the system is 'down' and not accessible. If this occurs you will need to clear your internet cache, use a different browser or use an 'incognito' tab to access it. It's a known and massively reported fault, so should hopefully be addressed soon.

Familiarise yourself with the system as best you can as it will be necessary to use for many tasks such as permit applications and Nights Away Notifications. There are a
